Foreseeing Danger and Acting ~ Proverbs 22:3

"A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself: but the simple pass on, and are punished."

A wise person doesn't ignore warning signs. They take them seriously and prepare accordingly. In contrast, the foolish dismiss them and suffer the consequences. We must ask ourselves: are we being prudent with the knowledge we have about the future? Or are we excusing inaction under the pretense of faith?

II. Increased Knowledge and the Age of Acceleration

The Rise of Knowledge ~ Daniel 12:4

"...Many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased."

Daniel was told that in the time of the end, knowledge would increase dramatically. We are undoubtedly living in that age. AI and technological advancements are exploding at a pace never before seen. This increase in knowledge brings both opportunity and grave responsibility. The wise will recognize the times and respond with diligence.

The Time is Now ~ Revelation 22:10

"Seal not the sayings of the prophecy of this book: for the time is at hand."

Unlike Daniel's time, where certain knowledge was sealed, we now have the full revelation and warnings plainly before us.

The signs are no longer hidden. Believers have no excuse for remaining unaware or unprepared. Now is the time to act.

III. The Trap of Endless Learning Without Action

The Paralysis of Knowledge ~ 2 Timothy 3:7

"Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth."

In an age overwhelmed by information, many people are caught in endless cycles of learning but never take meaningful action. Knowledge alone is not wisdom. The real measure of understanding is what we do with the knowledge we possess. Believers must not fall into the trap of passivity, endlessly consuming information without preparing for what's ahead.

Avoiding the Excuse of Procrastination ~ Ecclesiastes 11:1-6 (v. 4 Emphasis)

"He that observeth the wind shall not sow; and he that regardeth the clouds shall not reap."

Waiting for perfect conditions is a form of procrastination that leads to missed opportunities and failure. If we continually wait for the "right moment" to prepare, we will find that the moment passes us by. The wise person acts despite uncertainties, trusting God to guide and bless their efforts.

IV. Faith Requires Action

Faith Without Works Is Dead ~ James 2:17

"Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone."

True biblical faith moves us to action. It does not sit idly by while danger looms. Saying "God will take care of me" without doing what He has commanded is not faith; it is presumption. God blesses faith that acts-faith that plans, prepares, and trusts Him to guide the results.

Joseph's Example ~ Genesis 41

God revealed to Pharaoh through a dream that a famine was coming. Joseph's wise counsel wasn't to sit back and trust that God would miraculously provide when the famine struck. Instead, he advised that Egypt store up resources during the years of plenty to prepare for the years of scarcity. This was not a lack of faith; it was faith expressed through

V. Preparing Spiritually: Recognizing the True Nature of the Last Days

While it is wise to prepare for societal and economic changes, believers must also understand the time we are living in from a biblical perspective. Scripture repeatedly warns that we are living in the **last days**—not a distant, future period, but a time that began with the advent of Christ.

This is confirmed throughout Scripture:

With a clear understanding that we are living in the last days, believers must be all the more vigilant to guard against false teachings. Scripture warns that during this time, many will turn away from sound doctrine.

□ 2 Timothy 4:3-4 (KJV)

"For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; and they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables."

Many today follow teachings **built on the traditions and frameworks of men** rather than the plain instruction of God's Word. While some theological frameworks are well-rounded and helpful, others distort the truth and pull believers away from sound doctrine.

True discernment comes not from passively accepting what is preached from the pulpit, but from being personally rooted in the Word of God and taught by the Holy Spirit through diligent study.

□ 1 John 2:27 (KJV)

"But the anointing which ye have received of him abideth in you, and ye need not that any man teach you..."

This doesn't mean rejecting all teaching but reminds us that no teaching should be accepted without careful examination in light of Scripture. Like the Bereans (Acts 17:11), we are called to search the Scriptures daily and verify everything we are taught.

Final Exhortation: Prepare in Faith, Not in Fear

God does not call His people to live in fear, but neither does He call them to live in ignorance or laziness. The faithful believer walks in wisdom, exercising foresight, and making practical preparations while trusting fully in God's provision and care.
